Baystone Boutique Hotel & Spa is located in the heart of Pointe aux Canonniers in the north-western part of Mauritius, the picturesque and quiet village forms a peninsula and is therefore surrounded on three sides by the Indian Ocean.

Known for its turquoise water and thick sand, the beach of Pointe aux Canonniers is home to a wide variety of shells as well as fishing spot.

This Boutique Hotel is featured with a private beach overlooking the turquoise bay and stunning view of one of the most recognizable sights of Mauritius: the majestic rock of Coin de Mire (Gunners Point).

North Mauritius is famous for its white-sand beaches, lively villages, and great hotels. More sunny days than anywhere else on Mauritius, the north is the most touristic area on the island. Beautiful beaches such as Mont Choisy which extends from Pointe aux Canonniers to Pointe aux Piments, Trou aux Biches, Grand Baie, La Cuvette & Pereybere.

The main action is along the northwest coast, centred around the lively seaside resort of Grand Baie, a brandy-glass shaped, sheltered bay with an emerald lagoon and the island's best nightlife. Around fifty restaurants now line the 2km coastal road north to Pereybère, once a simple fishing village, while to the south the villages of Trou aux Biches and Mont Choisy. Grand Baie is the departure point for deep sea fishing trips and for boat excursions or catamaran to the islets in the north of Mauritius; Gunners' Quoin, Flat Island, Gabriel Island, Round Island, Serpent Island.

Pointe aux Canonniers offers proximity to Grand Baie,
Cap Malheureux, or Mont Choisy, while being far enough
away to keep you away from the hustle and bustle.
The northeast coast is less developed, with bustling
towns such as Goodlands and tranquil rocky shores from
where you can admire the pristine northern islands.
Inland, a sparsely populated area is sprinkled with onestreet towns such as Pamplemousses, home to a worldclass botanical garden and an interactive museum,
L'Aventure du Sucre.

The driving distance from Pointe aux Canonniers to the capital Port Louis is 22 km and 69 km to Mauritius Airport.





North Beaches

Trou aux Biches, one of the best swimming beaches on the island, with good snorkelling. Tucked away at its northern end is **Mont Choisy**, which at nearly 2km is the longest and most beautiful public beach in the north; the sandy bottom makes it an excellent swimming . **Grand Baie** Beach itself is famed for its emerald waters. A couple of kilometres north, the white-sand cove of *Pereybère* is one of the most popular beaches with both visitors and I ocals. Small but sweet, nearby *La Cuvette* is the north's prettiest swimming cove. To get away from the crowds, head for Anse la Raie, a narrow strip of white sand on a protected bay which, although a bit shallow for swimming, overlooks filao islands in the bay; or steps down to the sea at the wild Bain Boeuf, one of the best places to take in the views in peace



Grand Baie

The island's tourism capital with the greatest concentration of beaches and excursions— along with boutiques, restaurants, bars and nightclubs. Once a simple fishing village on a sheltered emerald bay, this bustling resort is known for its profusion of luxury yachts, shopping complexes and après-sol entertainment



Château Labourdonnais

Built in 1758, the stunning, colonnaded Creole mansion of Château Labourdonnais was modelled on Versailles, with a treelined avenue and fountains, and only opened to the public in 2010. The garden has the largest banyan tree on the island, planted by Charles Telfair, but it's most famous for its 150-year-old orchards that once supplied the island with fruit and where over fifty different types of mango alone are still grown.



The Northern Islets

Six uninhabited islands lie off the northern coast of Mauritius, four of which can be visited. Three are typically visited on a day-long catamaran cruise, stopping for snorkelling and a BBQ or picnic lunch, or alternatively by speedboat or pirogue. The nearest and most distinctive island is the wedge-shaped Coin de Mire (Gunners Quoin), just 4km offshore.

At the island's most northerly tip, the peaceful fishing village of

CAP MALHEUREUX, the Cape of Misfortune, is so-called because its history of shipwrecks before the British navy landed here in 1810. The pretty Roman Catholic church of Notre Dame Auxiliatrice is one of Mauritius's most photographed sites. It's set in an idyllic spot beside the sea and offers spectacular views over Coin de Mire and the northern islands, with pirogues bobbing in the water in-between.



Pamplemousses Gardens

The third-oldest botanical gardens in the world, begun in 1729, as governor Mahé de Labourdonnais' private vegetable garden. The 60 acres are now home to five hundred different indigenous and exotic species, including over eighty species of palm, such as the unusual Talipot palm from Sri Lanka which blooms once every thirty to one hundred years. The garden's stunning centrepiece is a pond with floating giant Amazon lilies.



Port-Louis

Driving distance of 21 Km from Pointe aux Canonniers is Port Louis, city, capital, and main port of the island of Mauritius in the western Indian Ocean.

It lies between a well-sheltered, deep water harbour, accessible to ships through a break in the coral reef, and a semicircle of mountains. The lively ethnic quarters of this bustling city display the rich diversity of cultures and traditions that have outlived colonisation. Port Louis is also the economic centre-point of Mauritius, the largest city of the island with approximately 200,000 inhabitants. A few landmarks will take you back in local history but it's also the right place to get a real feel of local life.



MON CHOISY LE GOLF

Set in the breath-taking northern region of Mauritius, Mont Choisy Le Golf is one of the island's most popular golf courses, famous for its various national and international golf competitions. Besides being the North's one and only 18-hole championship course, it also features unique Mauritian landscaping and black volcanic rock outcrops. Ponds and other waterpoints add character to the course, while natural sand hazards blend seamlessly with the grassy surroundings. The palm trees and large banyan trees around the clubhouse keep a watchful eye on the various events taking place on the neighbouring greens.

ACCOMODATION

Last but not the least; Suite No.1 the "Baystone Suite" have exclusive access to a roof top swimming pool overlooking the bay.

The exquisite Junior suites are located either on the ground or first floor in the main building.

The chic and sophisticated Deluxe Rooms are located in building B on the 1st and 2nd floor, overlooking the small coastal road of Pointe aux Canonniers, some 30 metres from the hotel's beach. MAURITIUS HOTEL MARKET

Hotel supply in Mauritius is distributed in six to eight main supply nodes, with the largest concentration in the North of Mauritius (40%), followed by the West (26%) and then the East (24%). The South (11%).

Mauritius has developed an extensive range of hotels networks, and many accommodation solutions. Today there are about 150 hotels of the Island of Mauritius situated on almost all parts of the Island.

Driven by an increase in the number of foreign visitors from Europe and Asia-Pacific due to an increase in the number of flight seats and sustained promotions, a boom is expected in the hotel industry in Mauritius.

Mauritius recorded more than a million bookings from 1st January 2022 to 1st January 2023, despite all the challenges Mauritius is set to reclaim its place as one of the most popular destinations in the world.

Tourism typically accounts for nearly 24 per cent of the nation's GDP, and the Government has set a target of 1.4 million visitors during the calendar year 2023.

Other drivers of tourism growth in Mauritius can to be attributed to several initiatives by the country's government and tourism authorities in the past few years, particularly government efforts to promote economic diversification, a favourable business climate and solid infrastructure.

"In addition to a premier luxury holiday destination in the world with a high rate of return, Mauritius is one of the most business and investment friendly locations".

Investors have been attracted to Mauritius due to the island's mature, safe environment, established resort tourism offerings and stable government and economy. European and Middle Eastern investors along with institutional investors often prefer Mauritius over continental Africa for these reasons. "Tourism has made an important contribution to this stability and, with the improving global economy and the country carving out a new future tourism economy based on innovation, the country will sustain positive tourism numbers well into the future".

ECONOMIC MARKET OVERVIEW

Mauritius's economic freedom score is 70.9, making its economy the 30th freest in the 2022 Index. Mauritius is ranked 1st among 47 countries in the Sub-Saharan Africa region, and its overall score is above the regional and world averages.

Since independence in 1968, Mauritius has undergone a remarkable economic transformation from agriculturally based economy to a diversified, upper-middle-income country that has attracted considerable foreign investment and has one of the Africa region's highest per capita GDPs. In the long-term, the Mauritius GDP Annual Growth Rate is projected to trend around 5.40 percent in 2023 and 4.00 percent in 2024, according to our econometric models. The services sector is the largest sector of the Mauritius' economy and accounts for 76 percent of total GDP.

The economy of Mauritius is a mixed developing economy based on agriculture, exports, financial services, and tourism.

Services and Tourism remain important economic drivers, and maritime security is a priority.
